

# A very strong majority of Ontarians think housing is an important or somewhat important contributor to the provincial economy

The Ontario Real Estate Association retained Nanos to conduct public opinion research among Ontarians to gauge their opinions on renovation and other tax credits, as well as the development of housing, landlord and tenant issues, and the provincial government meeting deficit targets. To follow is a summary of the findings.

## Housing tax credits

A strong majority of Ontarians believe housing is an important or somewhat important contributor to the provincial economy, and a majority support or somewhat support the provincial government introducing a number of housing tax credits, including an 'age-in-place' renovation tax credit and a home renovation tax credit.

A very strong majority of Ontarians think housing is an important or somewhat important contributor to the provincial economy

- **Over nine in ten Ontarians think housing is an important or somewhat important contributor to the provincial economy** – A very strong majority of Ontarians think housing, including the building, renovating and selling of homes is an important (60%) or somewhat important (32%) contributor to the provincial economy, while fewer than one in ten think this is a somewhat not important (three per cent) or not important (two per cent) contributor. Three per cent are unsure. Older Ontarians (55 plus) are more likely to say this is important (70%) than younger residents (18-34: 54%; 35-54: 54%).
- **More than three in four Ontarians support or somewhat support the provincial government introducing a home renovation tax credit** – A majority of Ontarians support (53%) or somewhat support (24%) the provincial government introducing a home renovation tax credit, while under two in ten somewhat oppose (eight per cent) or oppose this (eight per cent). Eight per cent are unsure. Older Ontarians are more likely to support this (55 plus and 35-54: 57% each) than younger residents (18-34)(42%). Homeowners are significantly more likely to support this (57%) than renters (38%). Ontarians who report usually voting Conservative (59%) or Liberal (56%) in provincial elections have a higher level of support for this than Ontarians who report they don't have a party they regularly vote for (47%).
- **Close to six in ten Ontarians say they are likely or somewhat likely to use the home renovation tax credits in the next year if introduced** – A majority of Ontarians say if introduced, they are likely (28%) or somewhat likely (31%) to use home renovation tax credits in the next year, while just under one in four say they are somewhat not likely (eight per cent) or not likely (15%) to do so. Nine per cent say this is not applicable to them, and eight per cent are unsure. Ontarians who report usually voting Conservative in provincial elections more often say they are likely to use this (37%) than those who report voting Liberal (27%), NDP (26%) or those who report they don't have a party they regularly vote for (25%).

A majority of Ontarians support or somewhat support a variety of renovation tax credits being introduced by the provincial government

- **A strong majority of Ontarians support or somewhat support the Ontario government introducing ‘age-in-place’ home renovation tax credits** – Close to nine in ten Ontarians support (63%) or somewhat support (25%) introducing a home renovation tax credit targeted at renovations that would allow Ontario’s seniors to age-in-place, while three per cent somewhat oppose this and two per cent oppose this. Seven per cent are unsure. Residents in Southwestern Ontario are more likely to support this (71%) than residents of the GTA (59%) or the City of Toronto (60%). Older Ontarians (55 plus) are significantly more likely to support this (79%) than those 18 to 34 (40%), and homeowners have a higher intensity of support (68%) than renters (53%). Ontarians who report usually voting Conservative (68%) or Liberal (66%) in provincial elections have a higher level of support for this than Ontarians usually vote for the NDP (52%).
- **Close to nine in ten Ontarians support or somewhat support the Ontario government introducing a green renovation tax credit** – A strong majority of Ontarians support (66%) or somewhat support (23%) the provincial government introducing a green renovation tax credit targeted at renovations that would improve the energy efficiency of a home (e.g. upgrading a furnace, new windows, new insulation), while fewer than one in ten somewhat oppose (five per cent) or oppose this (two per cent). Four per cent are unsure. Residents in Golden Horseshoe West are more likely to support this (73%) than residents of the GTA (60%). Older Ontarians (55 plus) are more likely to support this (74%) than those 18 to 34 (60%), and homeowners have a higher intensity of support (69%) than renters (59%).
- **Six in ten Ontarians say they would be unlikely or somewhat unlikely to purchase a home sooner if the Ontario government announced a land transfer tax holiday** – A majority of Ontarians say they are not likely (48%) or somewhat not likely (12%) to purchase a home sooner if the provincial government announced a land transfer tax holiday so that the tax would not apply to houses bought within a specific time frame (e.g. the next six months), while over three in ten say they are likely (13%) or somewhat likely (17%) to do so. Ten per cent are unsure. Younger Ontarians are likely to say they are likely to do this (20%) than those 55 plus (nine per cent).
- **Nearly three in four Ontarians think increasing the rebate for first-time home buyers would have a positive or somewhat positive impact on first-time home buyers** – A strong majority of Ontarians think that increasing the rebate for first-time homebuyers from \$4000 to \$6000 would have a positive (37%) or somewhat positive (38%) impact on first-time home buyers. Twelve per cent think it would have no impact, while three per cent think it would have a somewhat negative impact and two per cent think it would have a negative impact. Nine per cent are unsure. Ontarians who report usually voting Liberal or NDP are more likely to think this would have a positive impact (43% each) than those who report not having a party they regularly vote for (30%).

## Deficit

Although a majority of Ontarians support or somewhat support the provincial government running a larger deficit to help the economy, they also feel the province meeting deficit targets for the next three years is important or somewhat important.

- **Two in three Ontarians support or somewhat support the Ontario government having a large budget deficit to help the economy** – A majority of Ontarians support (26%) or somewhat support (40%) the provincial government having a larger budget deficit in order to help the economy, while just under one in four somewhat oppose (14%) or oppose this (10%). Ten per cent are unsure. Residents of the City of Toronto are more likely to support this (31%) than residents of Central or Northern Ontario (18%). Ontarians who report usually voting Liberal (38%) or NDP (35%) in provincial elections have a higher level of support for this than Ontarians usually vote Conservative (20%) or those who don't have a party they regularly vote for (18%).
- **A majority of Ontarians say meeting the deficit targets for the province is important or somewhat important** – More than seven in ten Ontarians say the Ontario government meeting the deficit targets set out to manage the province's deficit for the next three years is important (29%) or somewhat important (44%) to them personally, while just under two in ten say this is somewhat not important (12%) or not important to them (seven per cent). Eight per cent are unsure. Men are more likely to say this is important (35%) than women (24%). Ontarians who report usually voting Conservative in provincial elections are much more likely to say this is important (43%) than those who report usually voting for the Liberal party (26%) or the NDP (12%) or those who don't have a party they regularly vote for (26%).

## Landlords and tenants

A majority of Ontarians support or somewhat support allowing landlords to evict tenants for reasons other than non-payment of rent, with stronger support among homeowners and Progressive Conservative voters. A strong majority also support or somewhat support creating a temporary assistance program to financially assist landlords with tenants who cannot pay rent.

- **Over three in four Ontarians support or somewhat support permitting residential evictions to allow landlords to remove tenants for reasons other than non-payment of rent** – A majority of Ontarians support (48%) or somewhat support (30%) the Landlord and Tenant Board permitting residential evictions to allow landlords to remove problem tenants for reasons other than non-payment of rent, while under two in ten somewhat oppose (eight per cent) or oppose this (six per cent). Eight per cent are unsure. Support is higher among residents of Eastern Ontario (53%) and Southwestern Ontario (53%) and lower in the GTA (43%) and the City of Toronto (42%). Homeowners are more likely to support this (52%) than renters (36%). Ontarians who report usually voting Conservative in provincial elections are more likely to support this (59%) than those who report usually voting for the Liberal party (43%) or the NDP (35%) or those who don't have a party they regularly vote for (46%).
- **A strong majority of Ontarians support or somewhat support creating a temporary assistance program to financially assist landlords with tenants who cannot pay rent** – Over three in four Ontarians support (38%) or somewhat support (39%) creating a temporary assistance program to financially support landlords with tenants who cannot afford to pay rent for a prolonged period of time, while under two in ten somewhat oppose (nine per cent) or oppose this (seven per cent). Seven per cent are unsure. Ontarians who report usually voting Liberal (44%) or for the NDP (45%) in provincial elections are more likely to support this than those who report usually voting for the Progressive Conservative party (32%) or those who don't have a party they regularly vote for (35%).

## Housing developments

Over eight in ten Ontarians agree or somewhat agree that Ontario should accelerate the redevelopment of surplus land into residential and mixed-use developments, and a majority agree or somewhat agree that the province should speed up construction of new homes close to major transit areas.

- **Two in three Ontarians agree or somewhat agree that the province should focus on speeding up the construction of new homes around major transit stations and corridors** – A majority of Ontarians agree (28%) or somewhat agree (38%) that the province should focus on speeding up the construction of new homes and apartments around major transit stations and along the major transit corridors, while two in ten somewhat disagree (14%) or disagree (six per cent). Thirteen per cent are unsure. Residents of Eastern Ontario (33%) and the City of Toronto (32%) are more likely agree with this than residents of Central or Northern Ontario (23%) or Southwestern Ontario (19%). Ontarians who report usually voting Liberal (34%) or for the NDP (35%) in provincial elections are more likely to agree with this than those who report they don't have a party they regularly vote for (24%).
- **A strong majority of Ontarians agree or somewhat agree that the province should accelerate the redevelopment of surplus land** – More than eight in ten Ontarians agree (42%) or somewhat agree (41%) that the province should accelerate the re-development of surplus land such as former retail malls and industrial sites into residential or mixed use developments that include a mix of residential, commercial and recreational uses. Under one in ten somewhat disagree (seven per cent) or disagree (three per cent), and eight per cent are unsure. Residents of Eastern Ontario (49%) and Golden Horseshoe West (48%) are more likely agree with this than residents of Central or Northern Ontario (37%) or the GTA (37%). Older residents (55 plus) are more likely to agree with this (47%) than residents 18 to 34 (37%). Ontarians who report usually voting Liberal (49%) in provincial elections are more likely to agree with this than those who report they don't have a party they regularly vote for (36%).

Nanos conducted a representative online survey of 1176 Ontarians, drawn from a non-probability panel between August 26<sup>th</sup> and September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2020. The results were statistically checked and weighted by age and gender using the latest Census information and the sample is geographically stratified to be representative of Ontario.

The research was commissioned by Ontario Real Estate Association and was conducted by Nanos Research.

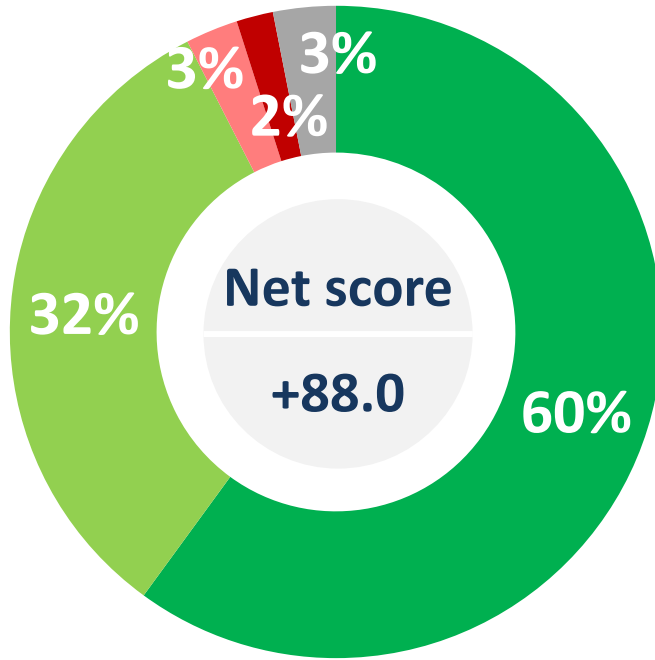

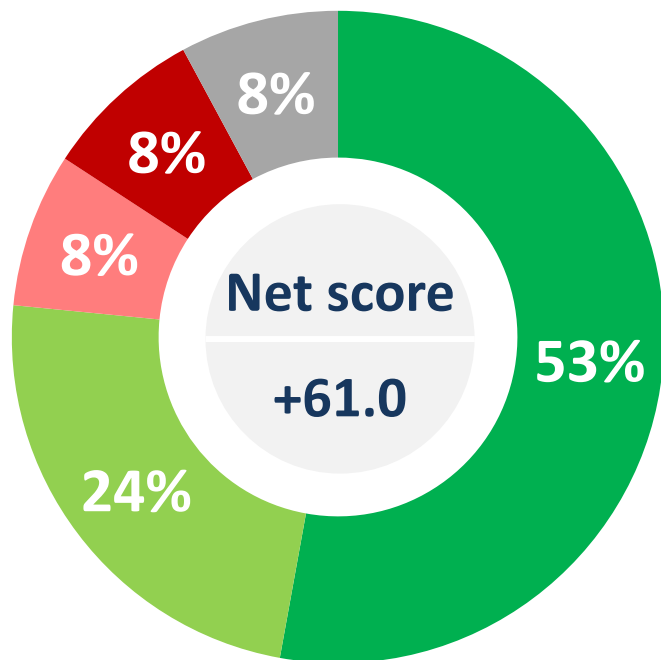

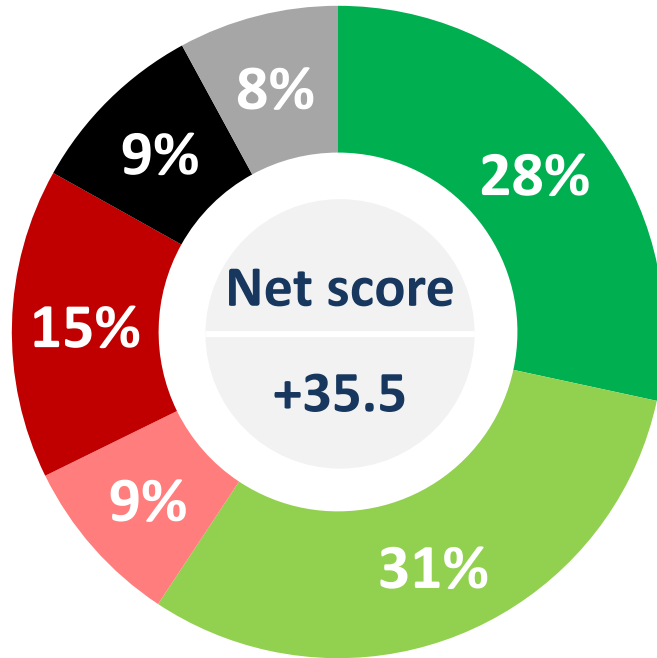

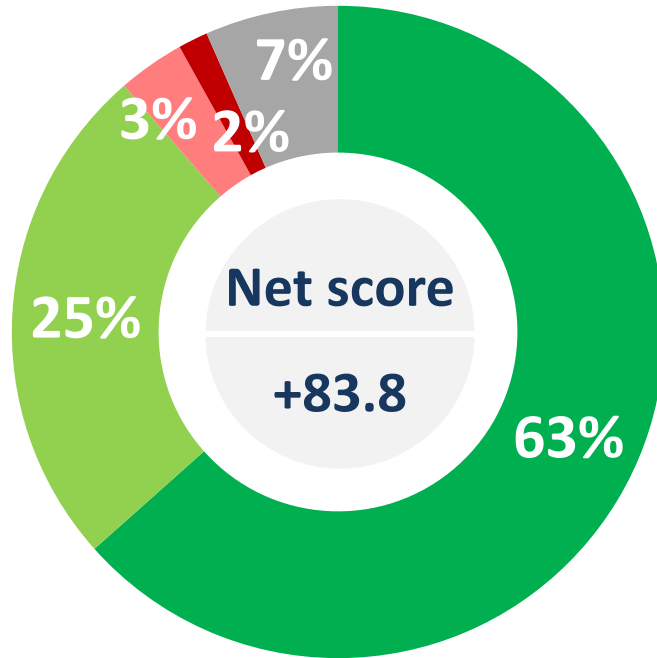

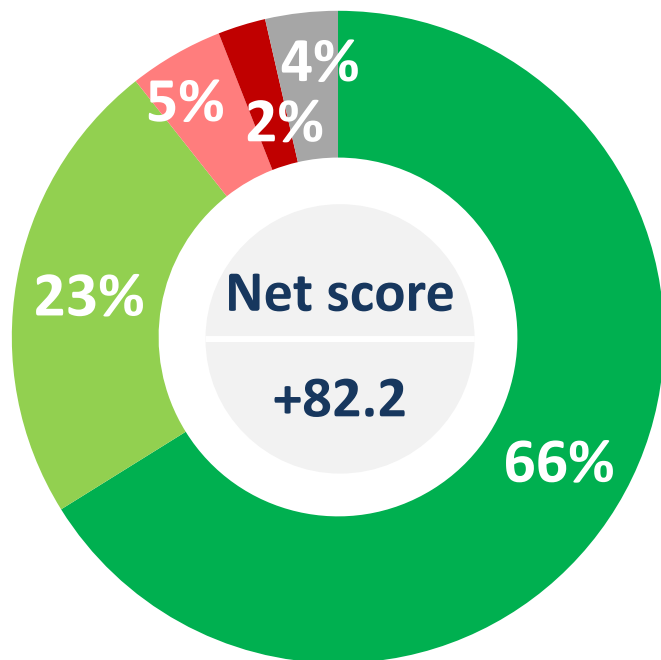

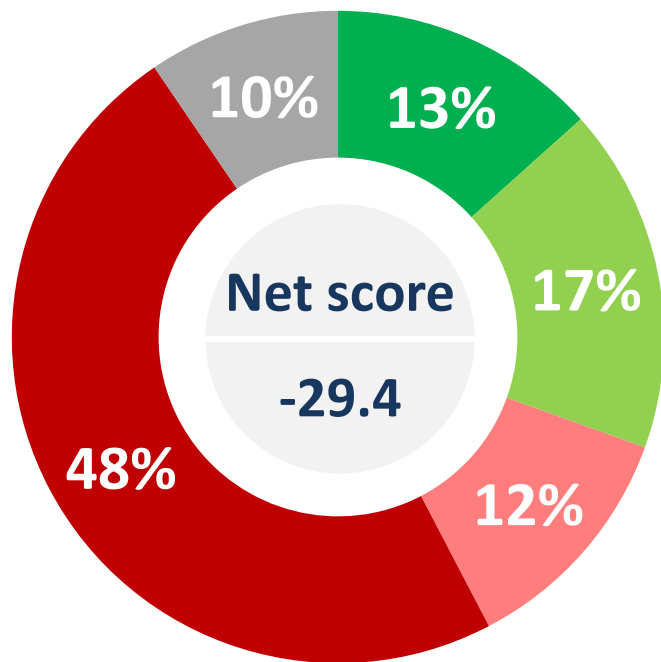

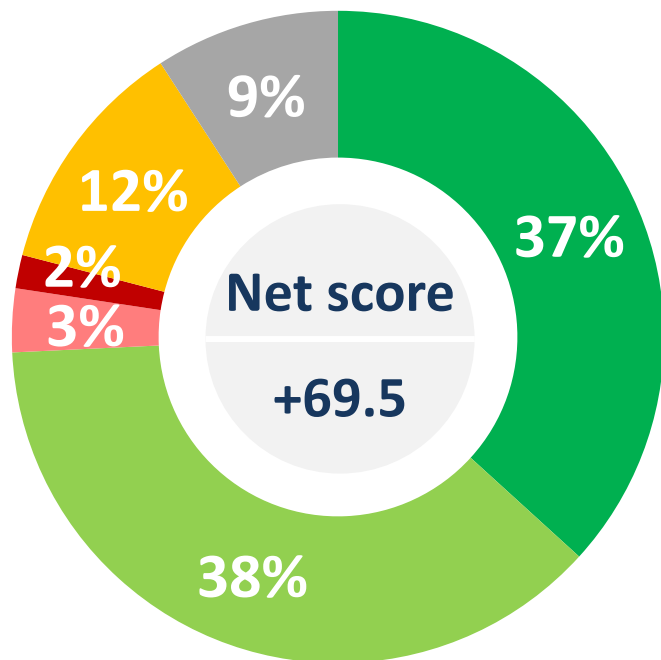

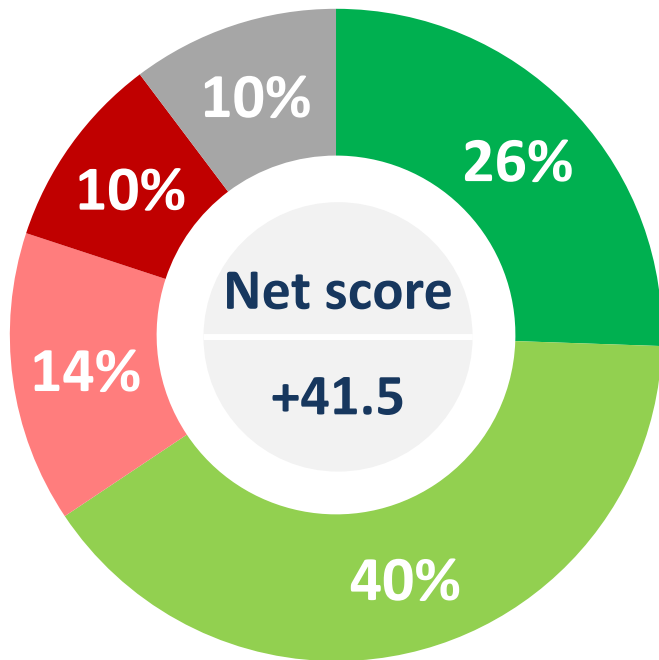

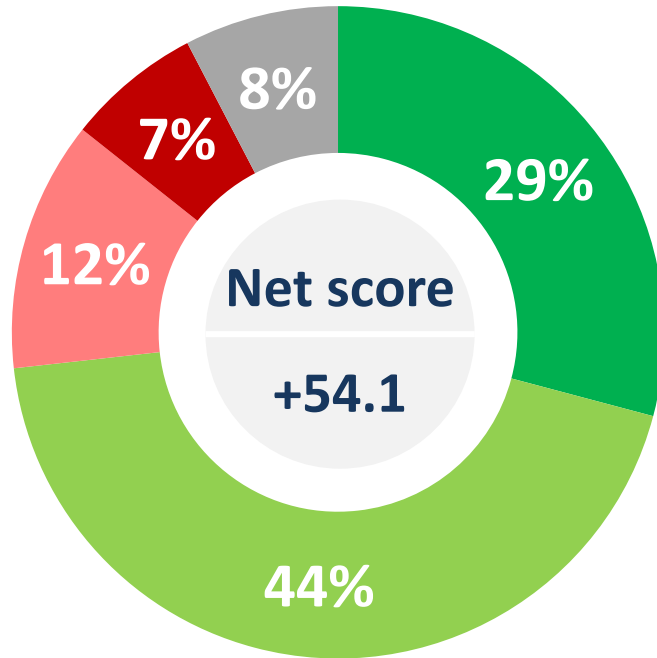

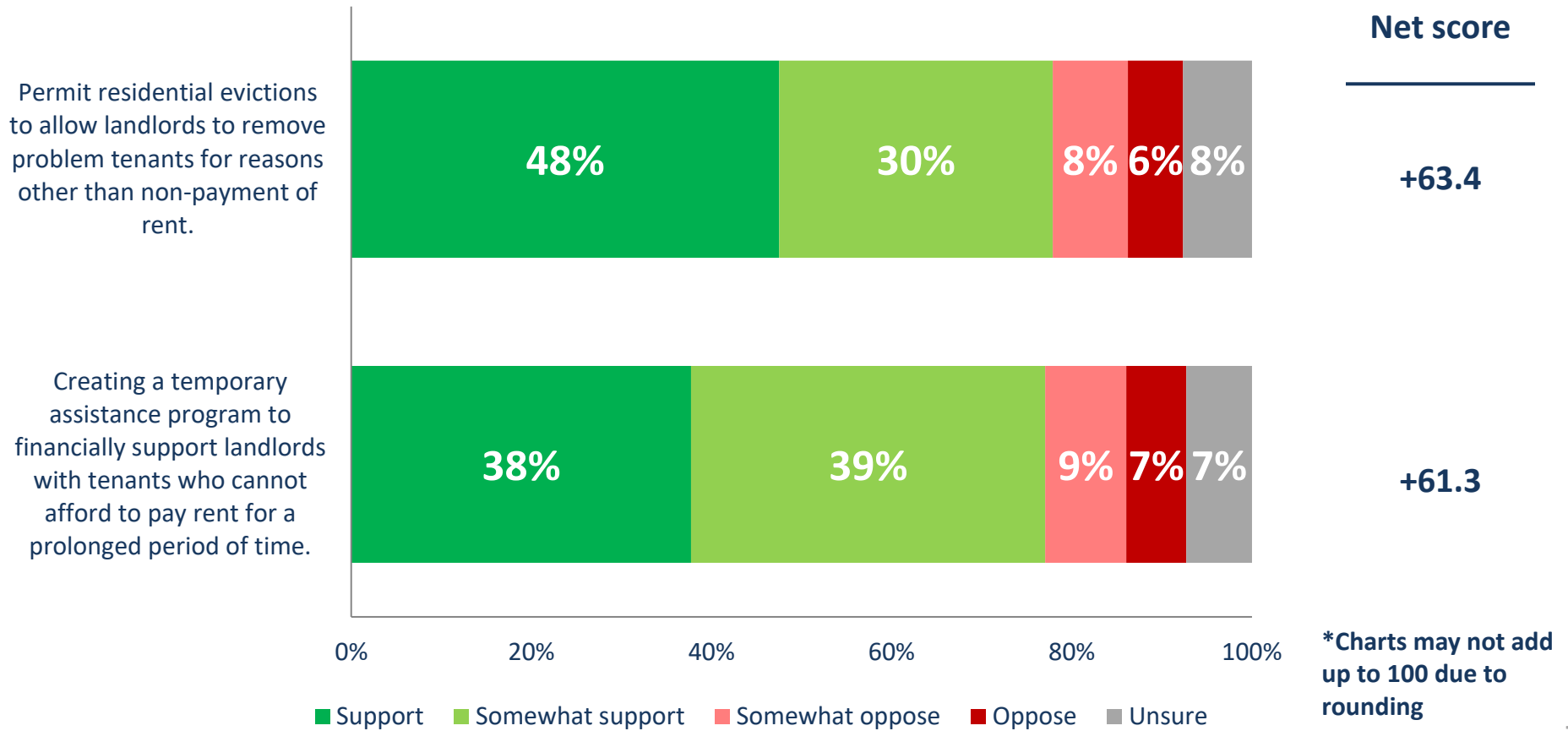

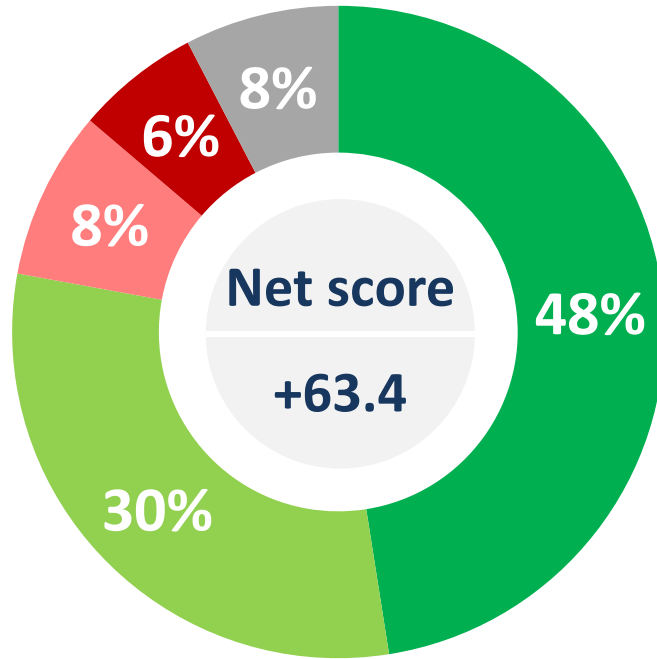

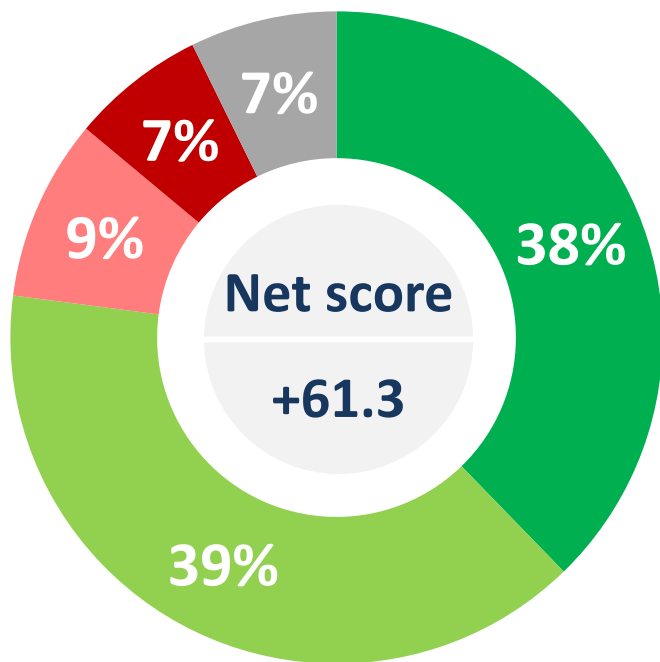

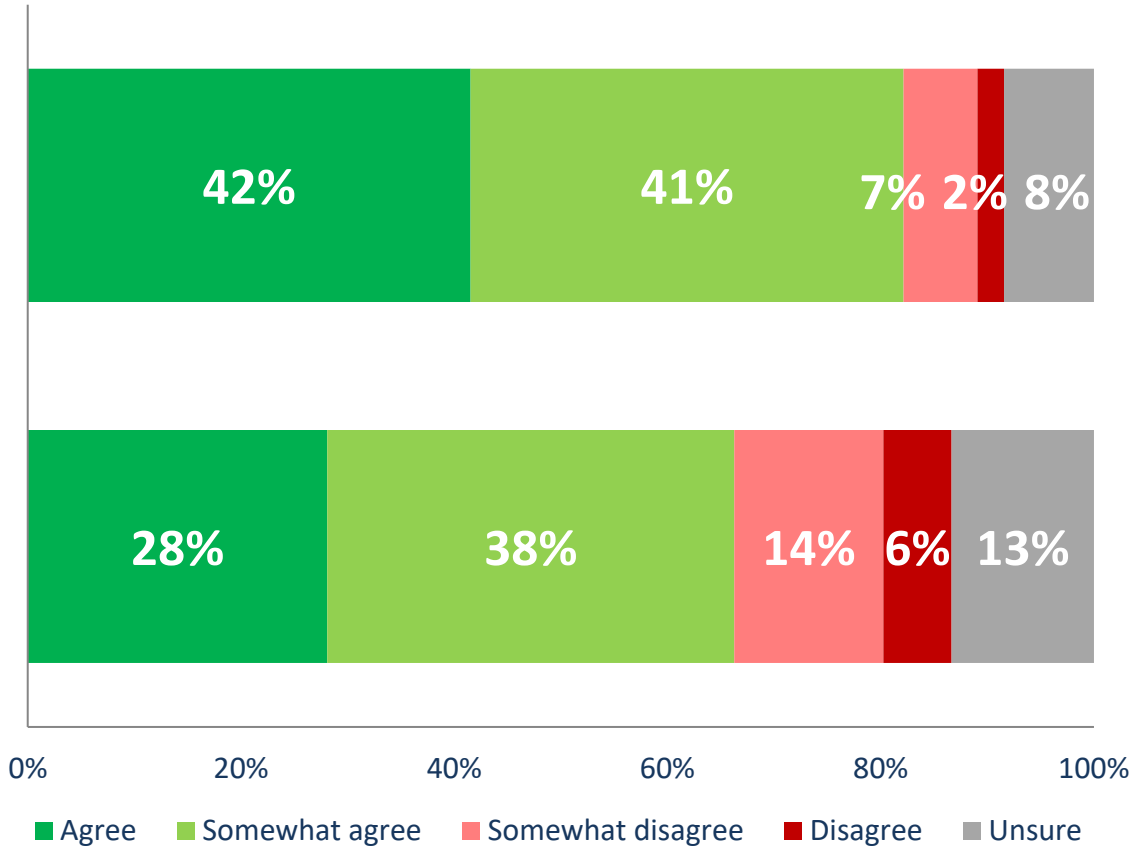

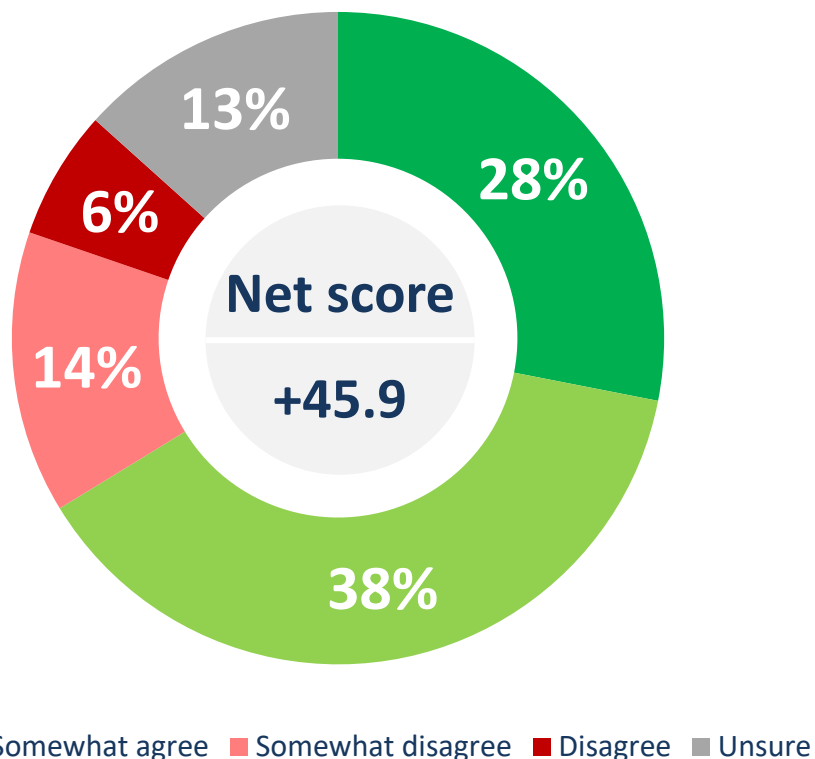

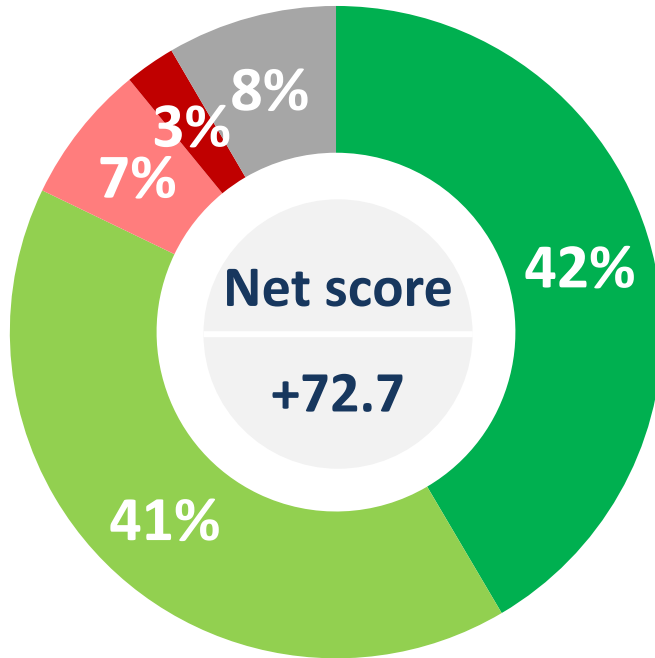

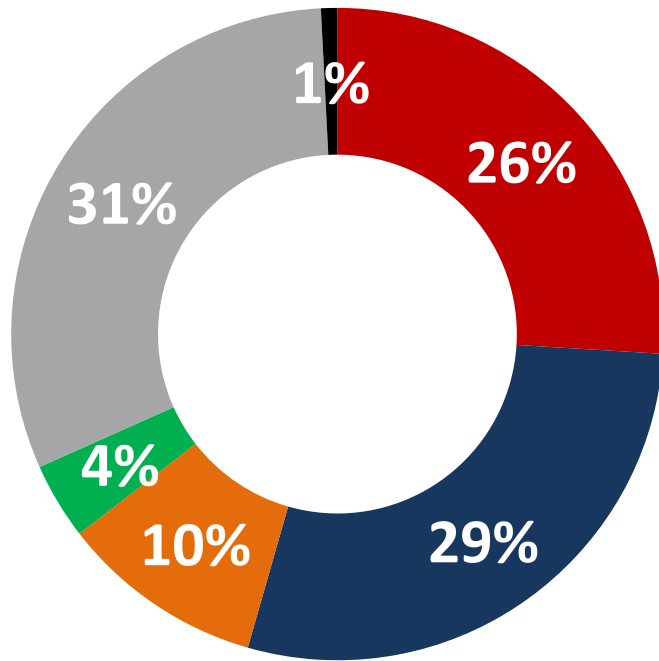
